Congratulations! One of your first and most important tasks is finding a place to live...and that means understanding the French housing system.

How this guide helps:

It breaks down public vs private housing, how to apply, guarantors, and how to avoid scams.

A quick reminder: Start early. Housing is competitive, especially in Paris, and other big cities.



Types of Student Housing in France

Housing Type	Description	Who It's For	Approx. Rent / Month
CROUS Residences	Public, subsidised student housing. Rooms or small studios, basic but functional.	Students with limited budgets; those who apply early; scholarship holders.	€120–€400 (depending on city & room type)
Private Student Residences	Modern, furnished student buildings with amenities, managed by private companies.	Students seeking comfort, safety, modern facilities, English-friendly support.	€500–€900 (higher in Paris; lower in mid- size cities)
Independent Studios	A private apartment rented directly from landlords or agencies.	Students who prefer privacy, independence, and long-term stability.	€500-€950 (Paris ~€800- €1,200)
Flat-Sharing (Colocation)	Sharing a multi- room apartment; shared bills and responsibilities.	Students wanting a social experience, lower rent, and larger living space.	€350–€700 per room (Paris ~€600–€900)

Living in CROUS (Public) Housing

Advantages: • Very low rent (~ €120-€400/month)

• Close to campus; subsidized.

Challenges: • Scarce availability, high demand,

Shared facilities.

Whow to apply: • Use the CROUS portal: trouverunlogement.lescrous.fr

 Create a profile on MesServices Etudiant

Apply early, especially for international students.

Pro-tips

 Even after applying, have backup options - CROUS spots are limited.

 Look for smaller CROUS rooms or "studettes" to lower costs.



Private & Purpose-Built Student Residences

- Advantages
- Furnished studios or rooms, common areas (study rooms, laundry), safety.
- Challenges:
- · Cost is higher than CROUS, but it is usually more comfortable
- How to apply: Search on Studapart, Uniplaces, ImmoJeune, etc.
 - Prepare your dossier de location (student ID, admission certificate, guarantor, etc.)
 - Use Visale or GarantMe if needed (especially if no French guarantor)





Pro-tips

- · Confirm if utilities (internet. electricity) are included.
- · Check contract duration (some are 9- or 12-month leases).
- Ask about on-site support: reception, maintenance, community events.



Studios vs. Colocation - Which is Right for You?

Studios

- Advantages:
- Complete privacy, control over space.
- Challenges:
- Higher rent + bills;
- May require a guarantor.

💙 Tips

- Use platforms like Le Bon Coin, Seloger, Studapart. <u>luluhives.com</u>
- Negotiate rent or request a virtual tour before paying anything.
- Secure a Guarantor: Visale (free) or GarantMe (paid) are common solutions.

Colocation (Shared Flats)

- Advantages:
- More affordable, social, flexible.
- Challenges:
- Less privacy, but shared responsibilities,
- Need to find compatible roommates.

💙 Tips

 Use platforms: La Carte des Colocs, Appartager, Facebook groups.



- Organise a video call or in-person meet-up with housemates.
- Split bills clearly: utilities, internet, deposit, and individual renters' insurance.

Your Pre-Arrival & Move-In Checklist

- Submit <u>CROUS application</u> early (if you plan to apply)
- Create digital rental dossier (ID, proof of admission, guarantor docs)
- Apply for <u>Visale</u> or <u>GarantMe</u> (if required) Research and bookmark housing platforms (<u>Studapart</u>, <u>Uniplaces</u>, colocation sites)
- Estimate your monthly budget (rent + utilities + insurance)
- Plan your move: key pick-up, lease signing, home insurance
- Schedule virtual or in-person visits

A garant in France is a person or service that guarantees to cover your rent if you're unable to pay, often required by landlords before signing a lease.
